THE SINGERS

The Singers is a chamber choir of around twenty two mixed voices based in Newcastle upon Tyne. Singers come mainly from Newcastle and Northumberland, but others travel considerable distances to participate. A high standard of musicianship and sight-reading is required as the group does not meet on a regular weekly basis largely owing to the numerous other musical commitments of members. The choir rehearses the third weekend most months in Newcastle.

This is our eleventh concert here in St Giles. We have also deputised here for the St Giles Singers when they have toured abroad. The Singers sing regularly in Durham Cathedral, Southwark Cathedral, and Cologne Cathedral as well as St George's, Windsor and Liverpool, Chester, Coventry, Blackburn and Carlisle cathedrals. The Singers hope to perform, in time, in all twelve, beautiful Romanesque churches in Cologne (still five to go!). The Singers will be singing in York Minster for the first time in April 2024.

Our last concert here in St Giles was in 2019 when we performed compositions by choir members Lisa McMaster and Edmund Hunt, both of whom still sing regularly with the choir. Edmund's *Vita Hominum* was written for The Singers who recorded it for broadcast on BBC Radio 3. The Singers have also been finalists in the BBC Choir of the Year competition.
