

## Abendlied, Op. 69 No. 3

Josef Rheinberger (1939 – 1901) Sung in German, for six part choir

Bide with us, for evening shadows darken, and the day will soon be over.

A prolific composer, Rheinberger composed a considerable amount of choral and organ music which is currently somewhat out of fashion in the UK.

## **Ave Verum Corpus**

Edward Elgar (1857 – 1934) Sung in Latin

Hail the true body, born of the Virgin Mary: You who truly suffered and were sacrificed on the cross for the sake of man. From whose pierced side flowed water and blood: Be a foretaste for us in the trial of death. O sweet, O merciful, O Jesus, Son of Mary.

## Versa est in luctum

Alonso Lobo (1555-1617) Sung in Latin, for six part choir My harp is tuned for lamentation, and the organ to those who weep. Spare me, O Lord, for my days are as nothing.

Lobo was a Spanish composer of the late Renaissance, a contemporary of Victoria and Guererro. This motet was written for the funeral of Philip II of Spain.

## If ye love me

Thomas Tallis (ca. 1505-1585) Sung in English

If ye love me, keep my commandments, and I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another comforter, that he may 'bide with you forever, e'en the spirit of truth.

#### **Ave Maria**

Tomás Luis de Victoria (1548 – 1611) Sung in Latin, for eight part choir

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Queen of heaven sweet and merciful, O Mother of God, pray for us sinners, that with the elect we may gaze upon thee.

#### Bogoroditse Devo, raduisya

Sergei Rachmaninoff (1873 – 1943) Sung in Church Slavonic

Rejoice O Virgin, Theotokos [God-bearer], Mary full of grace, the Lord is with you.
Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the Fruit of your womb, for you have borne the Saviour of our souls.

This is a movement from Rachmaninoff's setting of the Russian Orthodox Church's All Night Vigil. Written in 1915 and banned after the 1917 revolution. It was first recorded in 1965 by the USSR Academic Russian Choir – for export only!

## A Child's Prayer

James MacMillan, born. 1959

Welcome Jesu, Deep in my soul forever stay, Joy and love my heart are filling On this glad communion day.

Written in 1966 as a response to the Dunblane tragedy and first performed that year in Westminster Abbey, London. The words are sung by two sopranos in duet while the choir sings the word 'welcome' sixteen times. The choir joins with ecstatic grace note decoration on the word 'joy'. A further three 'welcomes' respond at the end of the piece.

#### As one who has slept

John Tavener, born. 1944 for eight part choir

As one who has slept the Lord has risen, And rising He has saved us. Alleluia.

The second choir sings a long continuous drone that rises while the first choir slowly meditates on the words with repeated alleluias. Tavener asks for a deeply solemn atmosphere full of 'awe, silence and expectation'. The words are taken from the liturgy of St Basil on Easter Saturday. The composer's suggested speed is slow and this makes this a very difficult piece to bring off!

## **Ave Verum Corpus**

Mozart (1756 – 1791) Sung in Latin

#### **Duo Seraphim clamabant**

Francisco Guerrero (1528-1599) Sung in Latin, for twelve part choir

Two seraphim cried to one another:
Holy is the Lord God of Sabaoth.
The whole earth is full of his glory.
There are three who bear witness in heaven:
the Father, the Word, and the Holy Spirit:
and these three are one.
Holy is the Lord God of Sabaoth.
The whole earth is full of his glory.

A masterly setting for three four part choirs. Word painting abounds as the three choirs respond to each other and join together for 'the whole earth if full of his glory'.

## **The Singers**

The Singers is a chamber choir based in Newcastle upon Tyne. The choir has been coming to St Giles every two years since 1992.

Last October the choir gave a concert in the National Trust's Seton Delaval Hall, near Newcastle. Last Christmas it joined the English Philharmonic Ensemble for Candlelit Concerts in Carlisle, Hexham and Newcastle. Each January the choir sings for the Epiphany Service in Durham Cathedral. At the end of April the choir made a return visit to Cologne where is sang in five of Cologne's magnificent Romanesque churches – St Severin, St Georg, Gross St Martin, St Andreas and St Aposteln. It also sang Choral Vespers in Cologne Cathedral. The choir also periodically visits London where it spends a weekend singing the services in Southwark Cathedral.
